The Cameron Police Department compiles statistics each year to determine crime trends and problem areas within our community. This information is imperative in forecasting trends and allocating resources to meet the demands of the community. Statistics and trends, for example, are important tools in setting police and communication staffing levels and determining training and education plans for both immediate and long-term planning.

The Police Department is proactive in our efforts to reduce crime in Cameron and its impact on citizens. This can only be done with teamwork developed between the citizens, visitors to our community, and other area emergency service agencies.

The Police Department is currently comprised of 16 full-time police officers, 1 reserve police officer, 7 full-time dispatchers, and 1 full-time records clerk. Most of the Police Department staff works rotating shifts to ensure there is police coverage for the community 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The Cameron Police Department is comprised of four basic divisions: Patrol, Investigations, Communications, and Administration. The Patrol Division is comprised of twelve officers who are responsible for patrolling our community, handling calls for service, traffic duties, and conducting misdemeanor investigations. The Investigations Division is comprised of two detectives and the School Resource Officer. The investigations division is responsible for conducting investigations of serious crimes and on-going cases. The Communications Division is comprised of six dispatchers and one dispatch supervisor. The Communications Division is responsible for taking calls for service, providing pre-arrival assistance to the caller and relaying that information to officers in the field as well as other emergency service personnel. The Administration Division is comprised of the Police Chief and the Records Clerk who are responsible for the day-to-day operations of the police department.



A NOTE FROM THE CHIEF

Welcome to the 2014 Annual Police Statistics Report. It is hard to believe another year has passed. This last year we have had several officers settling into their new positions and I am very happy to report they have exceeded my expectations.

We had some new faces at our department this past year with the two vacated positions in the Communications Center. I am very happy with our hiring process and the addition of our two new dispatchers. Our first new hire is Becky Beattie who previously worked for the St. Joseph Police Department in their Communications Center. Our second new hire was Taylor Knott who previously worked for the Clinton County Sheriff's Department in their Communication Center. Both new hires brought years of experience and it was a seamless transition into their new positions.



Corporal Dan Miller celebrated his 10 year anniversary and was also recognized at the City of Cameron's winter meeting. Dan previously worked for the Andrew County Sheriff's Department before accepting a position with the Cameron Police Department. Dan was later promoted to Detective and was assigned to the Criminal Investigative Division of the Cameron Police Department. Dan was also promoted to the rank of Corporal and is currently assigned to the Road Patrol as a supervisor.

Detective Erin Chubick celebrated her 10 year anniversary and was also recognized at the City of Cameron's winter meeting. Erin previously worked for the Nodaway County Sheriff's Department before accepting a position with the Cameron Police Department. While at the Cameron Police Department, Erin was assigned to the NITRO Task force which was a Federal drug investigative unit. Erin later was assigned to the School Resource Program and worked in the Cameron Schools. After that, Erin was assigned to the K-9 program and was then promoted to the rank of Detective. Erin is currently assigned to the Criminal Investigative Division.

Officer Dustin McCloud celebrated his 10 year anniversary and was also recognized at the City of Cameron's winter meeting. Dustin came to our department from the Police Academy. Dustin is currently assigned to the Patrol Division of the Cameron Police Department.



A NOTE FROM THE CHIEF

Dustin is also the Assistant Team Leader to the Cameron Emergency Tactical Response Team. In addition, Dustin is the shooting range officer and trains and qualifies our Department with firearms.

In 2014, our department looked into different Grant opportunities and as a result, we have been working with the Missouri Department of Transportation. Our Department received a Grant for off-duty Cameron Police Officers to work traffic enforcement on highways within the city limits. During the Grant work, the officers work traffic enforcement and their overtime is paid through the Grant money awarded to the City of Cameron.

The second Grant opportunity was also with the Missouri Department of Transportation. This Grant was obtained by the St. Joseph Police Department but is worked with several counties in Northwest Missouri. This Grant helps officers enforce underage drinking laws in our communities. The Grant pays for off-duty officers to check compliance at stores selling alcoholic beverages. With this Grant, we have also provided training to clerks at the Cameron Police Department's training room.

This last year one of our patrol vehicles was replaced with a new one. This vehicle was our K-9 vehicle and was replaced with a 2015 Ford SUV. With the Police Department's new purchase, we continued with our uniform look in the patrol division with the black and white format of the vehicles. We are very lucky to have Cpl. Eric Belshe with our Department who has a background in wiring the new vehicle. Cpl. Belshe also wired the new chargers and he has saved our Department thousands of dollars by outfitting all our vehicles in-house.

In 2014, our department worked with surrounding agencies to combat drugs in our community. After several months the joint investigation came to a close and yielded 24 arrests. These efforts were throughout the Cameron Police Department and several officers contributed to these efforts. I am very proud of the team work approach by all.

The Cameron Police Department staff looks forward to another year of working with our community, and always strives to provide the best service possible.



ORGANIZATIONAL CHART










Average Accidents by Month








K9 STATISTICS

K-9 Ex is the current canine for the Cameron Police Department. K-9 Ex, or “Ex Man,” is a six year old German Shepherd and has been with the Cameron Police Department since he was one. K-9 Ex is known by area law enforcement as being reliable and very methodical. K-9 Ex is trained in narcotics, tracking and police protection. K-9 Ex and his handler, Officer Kirkendoll, have received national certifications for narcotics detection through the North American Police Working Dog Association (NAPWDA).

K-9 Ex continues to be asked to assist various agencies with vehicle sniff’s and area searches. K-9 Ex is often called to assist with missing children as well as the elderly who walk away from their homes or nursing facilities.

INVESTIGATIONS / DETECTIVES

2014 was an eventful year for the Detective Division. Detectives Fugate and Chubick were busy settling into their new positions and continue to solve old cases while working toward prosecution of new cases.


The Detectives attended a two week Crime Scene School at the Johnson County Kansas Crime Lab. Detectives were taught how to better assist in bringing the scientific side of criminal investigation into the court room. Tools such as crime scene photography, blood spatter analysis, diagraming, fingerprinting and preservation of perishable evidence were topics of this training which are methods and tools Cameron Detectives use daily in the field.

Detectives have been busy working with local agencies with a goal of slowing the sale of illegal drugs in Cameron and surrounding areas. Detectives started working towards this goal in June of 2014. This joint investigation has currently netted approximately 24 arrests in the City of Cameron as well as Clinton and DeKalb Counties.

Recently, Detectives began working with local banks and businesses after seeing a rising trend in lottery phone scams, fraudulent tax returns scams, and other types of schemes that appear to mostly target the elderly. Detectives are providing training to local financial institutions on how to better detect and prevent these types of crimes.

The Cameron Detective Division's main purpose is to assist Officers with following up on leads and cases. Combined, Detectives have written over 476 reports and supplemental reports in 2014. Detectives continue to share information with local agencies through their intelligence flyers. Detectives have created over 35 intelligence flyers and are seeing how the sharing of information is assisting in slowing crime as well as assisting in solving crime.

Detectives Fugate and Chubick plan on attending training in 2015 to better assist the community in 'cyber' type crimes and become more proficient in the trending electronic applications used to commit these crimes.






UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING (UCR)

Uniform crime reporting is a collective effort on the part of city, county, state, tribal, and federal law enforcement agencies to present a nationwide view of crime. Agencies throughout the country participating in the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program provide summarized reports on eight Part I offenses known to law enforcement and reports on persons arrested. They also provide information about law enforcement officers killed and assaulted and on hate crime. For the most part, agencies submit crime reports monthly to a centralized crime records facility within their state. The state UCR Program then forwards the data, using uniform offense definitions, to the FBI's national UCR Program. Agencies in states that do not have a state Program submit their statistics directly to the national Program. The FBI compiles, publishes, and distributes the data to participating agencies, state UCR Programs, and others interested in the Nation's crime data.

The UCR Program has expanded in scope, importance, and size since its inception over seven decades ago. The Program began with law enforcement agencies in 400 cities from 43 states submitting crime data in January 1930 and now encompasses approximately 17,000 law enforcement agencies nationwide that voluntarily contribute their crime statistics. Without the support of these city, county, state, tribal, and federal agencies, the Program could not fulfill its mission to generate a reliable set of crime statistics for use in law enforcement administration, operation, and management. The completeness and accuracy of each agency's crime reporting is crucial to a wide variety of data users so that they can understand crime, formulate policies, make strategic and operational decisions, and conduct criminological research and analysis.

**For UCR, only aggravated assaults are considered Part I crimes. However, simple assaults (defined as not resulting in *serious* physical injury) are included in this report to give a more complete look at the number of assaults. The actual breakdown in 2014 was 28 Aggravated Assaults and 229 Simple Assaults.

Part I offenses can be cleared either by arrest or 'exceptional' means. An offense is cleared by arrest, or *solved* for crime reporting purposes, when (1) at least one person is arrested, (2) charged with the commission of the offense, and (3) turned over for prosecution (whether following arrest, court summons, or police notice).

***In 2014 two clearances for robbery were reported when suspects were arrested and charged in cases from previous years.




UCR PROPERTY SUPPLEMENT


The Property Supplement Report to UCR is an evaluation of the types and value of property stolen and recovered. This report also looks at the property stolen as associated to various Part I Offenses. 

In 2015, the Communications Center will be receiving a remodel and upgrade to Next Generation 9-1-1 equipment. Next Generation 9-1-1 is an IP based operating system which will allow photos and text messages to be integrated into 911 calls. The Cameron Communications Center will also be one of two back-up locations for the ACCD 9-1-1 System. The remodel of the communications is being completed in conjunction with the City's utility partner Ameresco and partially funded by savings created by their facility upgrades. All the updates, both physical and technological, to the Communications Center are expected to be completed in the Summer of 2015.




RECORDS DIVISION

The Records Clerk performs statistical analysis, clerical, customer service and departmental liaison duties. The Records Clerk assists the public, other agencies, and prosecutors who request information, copies of reports, or other assistance as necessary. Each case file requested for dissemination must be evaluated for availability via the Missouri Sunshine Laws and/or Missouri Rules of Criminal Procedure. This position provides the final ‘proof’ for case files before they are forwarded on for prosecution. The records clerk maintains all case and arrest files from their creation through their destruction or transfer to long-term storage.

The Records Clerk also administers and maintains the Department’s Livescan equipment which is used to submit fingerprints electronically to the State of Missouri as well as the Federal Bureau of Investigation for criminal history creation and identification purposes.
